We are passionate about supporting all our member organisations to make the best use of their data, technology and digital capabilities to the benefit of those they support.

We are committed to using our voice and platform to advocate for the sector and be a force for change. We want to make digital technology accessible and inclusive as a career pathway and recognised as professional and essential to any organisation's success.

We believe in a future when all charities and not-for-profits are able to deliver more and better outcomes for their beneficiaries, maximise efficiencies and amplify capacity, and play a key role in driving societal change and we believe that digital technology is the engine that drives this.

We aspire to be the go-to trusted advisor to the sector; the partner, and the change-maker on everything to do with digital technology and related disciplines. We also aim to ensure that digital technology is given the respect, credibility and voice it needs in order to deliver the best outcomes for charities and NFPs. That means we need to elevate digital technology leadership.

For many years, investment in technology was seen as depletory from the front-line delivery of services and whilst change is happening, there is a significant amount of legacy and technical debt to deal with and a significant skills gap at trustee and exec level. CITL is in a unique position to go from a networking body, providing support and education to technology practitioners, to being an umbrella body, driving standards and good practice across the sector and ensuring senior leaders in charities have all the knowledge and tools they need to deliver effective change programmes using technology.

We have over 100 members but are looking to grow significantly and reach more of the 200,000 charities and NFPs operating in the UK [1]. We are small, with a staff of two, but we are relevant, vocal and ready to move. We also punch above our weight in terms of delivery, recognition and credibility.

The best job in the world

Digital Technology is a vital component of delivering the good that charities do, but digital transformation, delivering our services and objectives directly to beneficiaries using online or self-service, has struggled to deliver the benefits we expect. Investment in charity digital technology is both limited and slow to materialise. Many charities and not-for-profit organisations are plagued by legacy technology. Systems that are old, hard to maintain and even harder to integrate into the services that really add value to beneficiaries.

To be fair, this problem is not solely the preserve of charities. Public sector and private sector also struggle to get the balance right between modernising legacy technology and delivering digital transformation.

Leadership - at all levels - is at the heart of this issue. Leadership of digital technology, leadership of organisations and lines of business, and leadership at trustee level. The Charity Digital Skills report of 2024 noted that 64% of charity Boards are lacking in digital skills. From discussions with peers in the industry, it seems that this is replicated in executive Board Rooms too.

While this problem is in some cases down to lack of desire from the CEO and other senior leaders, it's also clear is that many digital technology leaders lack the confidence, skill, or in some cases, desire, to muscle their way into the Board Room, even just to present.

So the challenge is clear and is twofold; how do we influence and lead charities and NFPs to ensure that digital technology has a seat at the top table and is valued accordingly, and how do we support digital technologists to upskill, to fight for the seat at the top table, and to be the advocates for digital technology at the most senior level.

Charity IT Leaders is uniquely placed to support, influence, and upskill leaders in the charity sector; both digital technologists and non-tech specialists. We seek to work with partners such as the Association of Chairs, The Institute of Fundraising, ACEVO, NCVO and CFG to strengthen our voice across the sector and drive the changes we need. We are now looking for a new Chair to take this mission and, building on our organisational change, make it real.

We need someone who can not only open doors, but can help our members to do the same, who can uplift our Board and our staff and who can help bring our members and our stakeholders on the next stage of our journey.

- Ensuring board and trustee performance is reviewed annually
- Listening and learning as well as organising and leading.
- Along with all trustees, take an active role in member recruitment, promoting Charity IT Leaders to new and existing members.
- Line management of the Charity IT Leaders CEO.

Job requirements

Driving us forward

- Brokering relationships and introductions across the sector including at C-Suite level, Board level and technology leadership level.
- Advocating and speaking at major events including our annual conference.
- Advocating for the sector and the specialism in the media and across social media channels.
- Working with the Chair, challenging and being a critical friend on the development
 of our strategy and plans and then approving, with the trustee board, the Charity IT
 Leaders Strategy and accompanying investment plans.

Duties and Responsibilities

As Chair of Trustees, you will be responsible for providing effective strategic leadership and management to the Board of Trustees, enabling them to fulfil their responsibilities for the overall governance and strategic direction of CITL.

Role, Purpose and Responsibilities

- The Chair is responsible for the performance of the CEO, and will be expected to
 establish and build a strong, effective and constructive working relationship with
 her and ensure she is held accountable for achieving agreed strategic objectives.
- You will provide leadership to the charity and its Board, ensuring maximum impact
 of CITL for all those involved in the organisation and will ensure trustees fulfil their
 duties and responsibilities for effective governance of CITL.
- You will be responsible for ensuring that the Board meets regularly to review
 activities, major risks and opportunities. You will lead on ensuring that appropriate
 systems are in place to take advantage of opportunities and mitigate risk with
 specific emphasis on the charity's financial health and wellbeing and to ensure
 financial accountability.
- You will lead trustees in the development of a strategic plan for CITL, ensuring that it is implemented in accordance with decisions of the trustees.
- With the Clerk, you will lead on the development of and implementation of procedures for Trustee induction, development, training and appraisal.
- With the CEO and Clerk, you will develop the knowledge and capability of the Board
 of Trustees, ensuring the Board is regularly refreshed and incorporates the right
 balance of skill, knowledge and experience needed to govern and lead the charity
 effectively, reflecting the wider population.
- You will encourage and facilitate positive change where appropriate, addressing and resolving any conflicts within the Board.
- You will act as an ambassador and advocate for CITL, representing it at external functions, meetings and events as appropriate, and as spokesperson for the organisation when appropriate.

Chair of Trustees Role Description - continued

Statutory Duties of a Trustee

- To ensure CITL complies with its governing document, and with relevant legislation and regulation
- To ensure CITL applies its resources exclusively in pursuance of its objectives so that money is not spent on activities not included in its own objectives.
- To have an enthusiasm for the work of CITL and the time and commitment to carry out the duties of Board member.
- To provide commitment, ability and time to prepare for and attend four Board meetings per year plus other training, planning and promotional events.
- To contribute actively to the Board of Trustees' role in giving firm strategic direction to CITL, setting overall policy, defining goals, setting targets and evaluating performance against agreed targets.
- Safeguard the good name and values of CITL.
- Ensure effective and efficient administration of CITL, including its financial stability.
- All Trustees are responsible for holding CITL 'in trust' for current and future beneficiaries by:
 - Ensuring the charity has a clear vision, mission and strategic direction and is focused on achieving these.
 - Being responsible for the performance of the charity and for its 'corporate' behaviour, ensuring that CITL complies with all legal and regulatory requirements.
 - Ensure the charity's governance is of the highest possible standard.

The above list of duties does not claim to be exhaustive. Trustees (including the Chair) will be expected to perform any additional duties commensurate with their roles.

Terms of Appointment

Chairs should expect to serve for no more than two terms of three years. Chairs are required to attend scheduled meetings and some ad hoc meetings. It is anticipated that the time commitment should be no more than two days per month but there will be occasions when extra time will be required (eg during planning of new projects or dealing with any particular difficulties that arise). Whilst the role of Chair is unpaid, reasonable expenses are payable in line with CITL's policy.

All trustees' terms of office are for three years, and there is scope for a trustee to serve for more than one term of office, as per the terms set out in the Articles of Association.

When trustees are approaching the end of their term of office, or anticipate that they will need to resign their positions mid-term, there is a general expectation that they shall provide no less than three calendar months' notice. Whilst it is recognised that there may be occasions where this is not possible, IA requires as much notice as possible for succession plans to be actioned and trustees' best efforts in this regard are much appreciated

About the Board

Board structure

- There are currently 13 trustees, all of whom attend and have voting rights at the quarterly Board Meetings.
- In addition, trustees also have a role on one of our three sub-committee meetings, these being:
 - The Ethics Committee
 - The Finance and Audit Committee
 - The Product and Marketing Committee
- The Ethics Committee is chaired by the Chair of Trustees, and is responsible for overseeing the ethical and reputational decisions and policies of the charity.
- The Finance and Audit Committee is chaired by the Treasurer, and is responsible for overseeing finance, risk management and related policies.
- The Product and Marketing Committee has responsibility for all marketing activity, including assets such as the website, and overseas delivery of our events and content. The CEO chairs this committee.

Meeting structure

- The Board meets four times a year for full Board Meetings. These are generally held online via Teams, and last around two hours. The meeting dates are set in advance and are scheduled to avoid clashing with other key commitments eg the annual conference, which is usually in October.
- Sub-committees all have a different schedule of meetings, appropriate to the areas they oversee. Generally these meetings also happen online, and usually last for 45 minutes to an hour.

Other commitments

- You will also need to meet with the CEO on a regular, currently monthly, basis.
 These meetings are generally online.
- Ideally, you will also meet with the CEO, Deputy Chair and Treasurer, on a regular basis. These meetings should be monthly or every six weeks and can happen online.
- You will need to attend our annual conference, which s generally held over three days in the first week of October.
- Additionally, you will also need to chair the AGM, also online, which happens in December.
- You will be required to oversee the production of our Annual Report and Accounts which must also be filed with the Charity Commission.
- There will be other occasions throughout the year when we would ask you to represent CITL either in-person or online. We will try and schedule these events at times which do not impinge on your other responsibilities, and if necessary, the Deputy Chair can attend in your stead.
